## **Discussion Questions: John's Gospel (1:19-34)**

These questions are to use (or not) as a group may see fit.

- 1. What are your questions, wonderings, disagreements, reflections, AND/OR connections, from the teaching this past Sunday on 1:19-34 where John the Baptist's testimony about himself AND Jesus is highlighted by the author?
- 2. As discussed last Sunday, the author's focus in this passage is on John the Baptist's witness/testimony about Jesus. John the Baptist testifies to the following three things about Jesus:
  - a. He is the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world.
  - b. He baptizes with the Holy Spirit.
  - c. He is the Son of God.
    - What questions or wonderings do you have about any of these three roles of Jesus?
    - Which of these three things about Jesus feels most closely related to your own experience of faith?
    - Which of these three things about Jesus feels most distant or obscure from your own experience of faith?
- The authoritative witness of John the Baptist and the author, John, is based upon their
  personal, eye-witness experience of Jesus. While we have not had the experience of
  being eye-witnesses to Jesus, each of us, on some level, has had our own "experience"
  of Jesus.
  - a. In what way(s) might you be able to say that your own experience of Jesus is like that of John the Baptist's or John the author?
  - b. How is your/our experience different from these authoritative witnesses?
  - c. How would you say someone can experience Jesus today?
  - d. How do you personally think about the act of "witness" as a role that Jesus believers play today? Is this important? Not? How do you think about it?
- 4. John the Baptist declares to those questioning him that "among you stands one whom you do not know" (1:26). John the Baptist, as a person who knew Jesus (as a cousin), could also truthfully say, "I too did not recognize him" (1:31). Even after John the Baptist receives the confirming sign of the Spirit descending upon Jesus, he continues (after being imprisoned) to wrestle with doubts about Jesus' identity. Is this a part of your own experience? In what ways might John the Baptist's experience also be true for you today?
